Iowa

Iowa Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program is funded in part through federal investments from the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (Home Visiting Program), and provides voluntary, evidence-based home visiting services to at-risk pregnant women and parents with young children.

The Home Visiting Program, which builds upon decades of scientific research, provides voluntary, culturally-appropriate, individually-tailored supports to families in their homes, including providing information about children's health, development, and safety, and when appropriate, referrals to support services.

Through federal grants from the Home Visiting Program, in fiscal year 2015, home visitors in lowa:

- made 17,010 home visits to 2,420 parents and children in 1,275 families;
- enrolled 850 new parents and children to the program; and
- served families living in communities in 18 counties across the state, or 18% of lowa counties, of which 15, or 78%, are rural.


The Home Visiting Program in Iowa:

- expanded access to evidence-base home visiting in Iowa's most at-risk communities;
- implemented a single data system for all family support programs; and
- developed and expanded a statewide coordinated intake system for families with young children in partnership with the Iowa Department of Education.

Like all Federal Home Visiting Program grantees, Ohio uses home visiting models that are proven effective. Ohio leverages federal funds to implement the following evidence-based models to serve children and families across the state:

- Early Head Start
- Healthy Families America
- Nurse-Family Partnership
- Parents As Teachers

<u>Title V MCH Block Grant</u> <u>Snapshot for Iowa</u>

The Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program is administered by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) in close partnership with the Administration for Children and Families (ACF). The Program supports at-risk pregnant women and families, and helps parents of children from birth to kindergarten entry tap the resources and hone the skills they need to raise children who are physically, socially, and emotionally healthy and ready to learn.

Research shows that home visits by a nurse, social worker, early childhood educator, or other trained professional during pregnancy and in the first years of life improve maternal and child health, prevent child abuse and neglect, increase positive parenting, and enhance child development and school readiness.
